Dear Transportation Authority Board Members,

Please repeal Ordinance No. STA 20-001 and withdraw your request to the Board of Supervisors to place the measure on the November Ballot.

I ask you to do this for the following reasons:

- 1. It is unconscionable to contemplate a tax increase while in the midst of an economic calamity that to date in California has resulted 4.7 million initial jobless claims and an unemployment rate of 16.3 percent, 3 percentage points higher than the national average.
- 2. Sales taxes are highly regressive having a disparate impact on the residents of our community that can least afford it.
- 3. Just as citizens must manage their budgets for difficult times, government entities need to do the same.
- 4. Sacramento County sales tax is 50 basis points higher than most of its neighboring counties, incenting residents to shop in neighboring counties. Raising Sacramento County sales tax an additional 50 basis points would further exacerbate this problem and make the County's sales tax higher than 88 percent of all counties nationwide.
- 5. High taxes and tax increases have a deleterious effect on business formation and retention and job creation and retention in the county.
- 6. Sacramento County residents are already paying at least two other transportation taxes as a result of gas taxes and state and federal taxes
- 7. The projects outlined for the new tax would have a disparate benefit on those that pay the tax, with a small percentage reaping most of the benefits.
- 8. In the May meeting you received an overwhelming response from over 700 respondents who opposed the ordinance. Subsequent polling has shown that the measure would fail in November. The people have made their views on this matter clear. Do not waste 1 million of the taxpayer's dollars to put this on the ballot in November.
